The website gives you a host of information on issues around excessive drinking, consumption patterns and the consequences of excessive drinking. You can also complete a short questionnaire on your drinking habits and find out whether they are risky and harmful. The site also contains a quiz you can complete to see how much you really know about alcohol.



In terms of the seriousness of the consequences of excessive drinking, Slovenia occupies an unenviable position at the very top of European and world tables.

Every day in Slovenia, at least two people die of causes related exclusively to alcohol. If we add road accidents to this, an average of 927 people die every year from alcohol-related issues.

228
million euros a year in costs arising from alcohol consumption

The costs of alcohol consumption to the healthcare system are estimated at EUR 147 million a year. Add to this the estimated other costs related to alcohol consumption (road accidents, domestic violence, crime) and this figure rises to EUR 228 million. Around EUR 103 million flows into the national budget from alcohol excise duty every year.
